CA 'D'ORO Bakery

Earlier this year, the Food Pantry was spending more than we were receiving in donations and other income, and one of the reasons was because we were spending more on food. One of our significant expenses is bread. In an effort to reduce that cost, we approached several retail grocery operations to see if they would donate leftover bread, but were unsuccessful. While we were struggling with this dilemma, we received a phone call from CA'D'ORO Bakery. They have a commercial bakery in Inglewood, and invited us to pick up their excess bread

We learned that CA'D'ORO bakery was founded in Santa Monica, California in 1990. They originally served as a commissary for the La Scala restaurant group. In 2007, CA'D'ORO expanded its operation by open-



ing a second facility in Inglewood, California. It is from the Inglewood location that they reached out to the Food Pantry. CA'D'ORO Bakery sells fine bread and other baked goods to over 200 restaurants, hotels, and catering companies in the Southern California market. Their bread is baked fresh daily and contains no preservatives.

As appreciative as we are for the bread we receive from grocery outlets, the bread we receive from CA'D'ORO is much better and fresher than we could ever expect to get elsewhere and is served in restaurants our clients are never likely to dine in. Our clients receive the bread shortly after baking and much earlier than the diners at the fine restaurants. Our clients receive the bread at the start of the day—before the restaurants serve it for lunch and dinner. Truly, CA'D'ORO finding us at a time when we needed their product is one of the small miracles we see frequently as we pursue our mission to feed the poor.


